

Message from the President

Greetings to Alumni, Families and Friends—

It is with great humility and pride that I address this message to you. In you I find strength and my solace.

The year 2019, is the year of return for African Diaspora. Diaspora being the term commonly used to describe the mass dispersion of peoples from Africa during the Transatlantic Slave Trades from the 1500s to the 1800s. You know the history.

In the heart of Accra, Ghana's capital, just a few meters from the United States embassy, lies the tomb of W. E. B. Du Bois, the great African American civil rights leader. He "returned home" to Accra in 1961, living there until his death in August 1963. This Du Bois journey to Ghana may have signaled the emergence of a profound desire among Africans in the diaspora to retrace their roots and return to the continent.

In Washington, D.C., in September 2018, Ghana's President, Nana Akufo-Addo, declared and formally launched the "Year of Return, Ghana 2019" for Africans in the Diaspora. At that event, President Akufo -Addo was emphatic that the world knows of the extraordinary achievements and contributions Africans in the diaspora made to the lives of the Americans and it is important that this symbolic year -400 years later - we commemorate their existence and their sacrifices.

The world also knows of the extraordinary achievements and contributions of the students of the Tarboro Colored High School and W. A. Pattillo High School to the lives of its people. "To Everything There Is A Season." Almost 100 years later this is our season to look back at the history of our schools and communities. Metaphorically we will "mount the shoulders" of the giants again. Those individuals who were our "needs answered, our board and our fireside." Those individuals who knew that we had to be prepared for a new era in the history of mankind, one of fears and uncertainties and like the plowman of old, we would have to "plow deep and straight in the virgin soil that we found." We did, each one of us, and just look at us now!

As we celebrate this "moment in time" we retrace our steps through the halls and portals of Princeville Elementary School, Tarboro Colored High School and W. A. Pattillo School. We can feel the rap on the knuckles to solve "a square" plus "b square," we hear the retort of "a winner never quits, and a quitter never wins" and we recall the pride of standing as we sang Lift Every Voice and Sing. Yes, in this moment we know from "whence we have come and why."

~ ALUMNI HISTORY

The W. A. Pattillo High School Alumni Association was the brain child of four of its graduates – Nathan Lewis (Class of 1955), William Boyd (Class of 1959), Rayfield Perkins (Class of 1955), and George Worsley (Class of 1940). Members of the Class of 1955 consented to contribute proceeds from their class reunion held in 1978 to organize the Pattillo Alumni Association. Nathan, Rayfield, William and George made several contacts, encouraging and recruiting other graduates and former students to participate and attend meetings. As a result, chapters were formed in various cities since many of the participants resided out-of-state, predominately in Washington, DC and Philadelphia, PA.

More supporters were attracted following the first reunion. They included: Iris Braswell, Charlie Brown, Lois Cobb, Myrna Deloatch, Evelyn Faulk, Eunice Parker, Hubert Simmons, Grace Swinson, Rev. James Wooten, Marvin Purvis, Eva Bell Norfleet, and Willie "Jig" Giles. During that time, the Interim National President was Nathan Lewis and Iris Braswell served as the Tarboro Chapter President. Alfred Norfleet became the Washington, DC Chapter President and Grady Ashe was elected as the Baltimore, MD Chapter President.

Under the tenure of National President Earlene W. Lawrence, in 1983, the alumni association secured a state charter and become incorporated. Pattillo graduates, Attorneys Jessie Baker and Glennie Matthewson provided assistance. Initially the organization was chartered as the Tarboro Black Education Alumni Association but was later amended to be the W. A. Pattillo High School National Alumni Association, Inc. Charter members included: Grady Ashe, Iris Braswell, Cora Boddie, Jimmie Bullock, Helen Knight, Lorna Lloyd, George Matthewson, and Thomas Perry. The Tidewater chapter was later formed in 1983.

Several Pattillo attendees have served as the National President. They are Nathan Lewis, Jimmie Bullock, Barbara Bratcher Anderson, Earlene Knight Womack, Eva Norfleet, Thomas Newton, and Varnell Vines Kinnin. Fred E. Wood, Jr., Ed.D., was elected in July 2011 and is currently serving in the capacity as National President.

The association has a 501c (3) status with a Board of Directors and a standard slate of officers. It continues to carry out the purpose according to the articles of incorporation which is: to provide scholarships and grants to students deemed worthy by the organization for assistance to further their education; and to provide financial and other assistance to educational institutions at all levels. The association has donated over \$100,000 in scholarships, incentive awards and contributions which have been given to area students and schools in the Edgecombe County Public Schools and beyond since its inception. In 2014, the first Nathan Lewis Member Scholarship was awarded to a senior who graduated from high school in Erial, New Jersey.

The association sponsors a variety of programs and supports local businesses; however, contributions to education are the core of its success. The alumni association will continue its endeavors to improve mankind's quality of life by supporting education at all levels.

OPERATION OF THE ASSOCIATION

The W. A. Pattillo High School National Alumni Association, Inc. was the vision of graduates Nathan Lewis, William Boyd, Rayfield Perkins, and George Worsley.

In 1978 following a very financially successful reunion of the Class of 1955, Nathan Lewis and other members of the Class of 1955 agreed to donate the financial proceeds from their class reunion to organize the W. A. Pattillo High School National Alumni Association.

The purpose of the Association is to provide scholarships and grants to students which the organization deems worthy to assist in furthering their education, and to provide financial and other assistance to educational institutions at all levels. The Association is a 501c (3) organization with a Board of Directors and the normal array of corporate officers. Basically, the purpose is the sponsorship and participation in community activities and to have an Annual Reunion celebration that will provide for fellowship and preserving the legacy of W. A. Pattillo High School.

The Association operates basically on three arms: administrative, programs and scholarships. Daily administrative functions are the responsibility of the officers and are supported from membership dues and fundraising efforts. The reunion is self supporting. Officers, chairpersons and directors-at-large receive no financial compensation. Their time and services are strictly on a volunteer basis.

During the association's fiscal year, a number of programs sponsored are spearheaded by a specific committee. The Scholarships and Awards Program is our largest program. It is vital to the success of the association and consistent with its purpose. The Scholarship Committee coordinates and implements the Board approved recommendations for the Scholarship and Awards Program.

All alumni, faculty, staff, family and friends of W. A. Pattillo High School are urged to join the Association. Your support will be appreciated.

HONORS/RECOGNITIONS

The following categories have been created to recognize individuals for specific scholastic careers, outstanding achievements, outstanding citizenry on local, state, national and/or international levels, and/or service to the alumni association:

ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA

Distinguished Graduate

The applicant must be a graduate of the Tarboro Colored High School or the W. A. Pattillo High School and currently a United States citizen. The person can be living or deceased. The person need not be a current member of the W. A. Pattillo High School National Alumni Association, Inc. The person must be in good standing as a citizen in the governmental jurisdiction where she/he resides and at the ascending governmental levels.

Hall of Fame

The Alumni Association established its Hall of Fame Awards Program to acknowledge those persons who as students positively exemplified themselves during their scholastic career. The committee will consider the areas of Band/Chorus, the Arts and Sports. Applicants must have (1) attended Princeville Graded School, Tarboro Colored School, or W. A. Pattillo High School; (2) participated in at least one full year of band/chorus, the arts or sports; (3) received some form of recognition for performance from the school; (4) received some form of recognition for performance from the community.

Founders Award

The applicant must be a citizen of the United States, living or deceased, who is or was in good standing as a citizen in the governmental jurisdiction where he/she resides/resided and the ascending governmental levels. The award, introduced in 2019, recognizes a person who has given outstanding service to the citizenry of the local, state and national levels and demonstrated the she/he personifies the spirit of selflessness and service as advocated by the association founders – Nathan Lewis, Rayfield Perkins, William Boyd and George Worsley, as they worked to create a spirit of reunion and fellowship.

Trojan Award

This *Member Recognition Award*, introduced in 2019, recognizes a person who is a current and longstanding member of the W. A. Pattillo High School National Alumni Association, Inc. This award is made in recognition of his/her loyalty to the association and who through the years, has rendered conspicuously distinguished service to the W. A. Pattillo High School National Alumni Association, Inc. without compunctions or reservations.





2019 Honorees

SCHOLARSHIP AND AWARDS PROGRAM

High School Scholarship Eligibility Criteria

The W. A. Pattillo High School National Alumni Association, Inc. established its scholarship program to assist students who desire to attend college. The association takes an active role in assisting communities and truly believes in "helping people!" Students can receive one (1) scholarship valued up to \$1,000.00 to attend a college or university of his/her choice. The Scholarship Program will recognize academic achievement, integrity, need, and community service.

Seniors meeting the criteria will be eligible for consideration. The criteria have been designed to allow the Scholarship Selection Committee maximum flexibility in awarding the scholarship. The Selection Committee will recognize the individual in the senior graduating class most deserving an opportunity to attend college. The recipient will be selected without regard to race, sex, creed, color, religious preference, age, national origin and disability.

The Scholarship Selection Committee will use the following criteria to award all W. A. Pattillo High School National Alumni Scholarship categories. A scholarship will be awarded to an applicant:

- •Who is a senior and has been accepted to a community college or a four year college/university.
- Who is a senior of an accredited public, charter or parochial school.
- •Who best exemplifies the member philosophy of the alumni association and has demonstrated acceptable academic qualifications.
- Who is a citizen of the United States.

The decision of the Scholarship Selection Committee will be final.

W. A. PATTILLO HIGH SCHOOL NATIONAL ALUMNI ASSOCIATION, INC. SCHOLARSHIP CATEGORIES

WALTER A. PATTILLO ALUMNI SCHOLARSHIP

This scholarship will be presented to a college-bound graduating senior who receives the highest ranking from the Selection Committee. Some of the considerations for this applicant will be grade point average (GPA), SAT score, extracurricular activities and community service.

W. A. PATTILLO ALUMNI SECONDARY SCHOLARSHIP

This scholarship is named for a former faculty member of W. A. Pattillo High School or Princeville School. This scholarship will be awarded to a senior who has a cumulative GPA of at least 2.0 to 2.5 and can demonstrate financial need and/or hardship.

NATHAN J. LEWIS ALUMNI MEMBER SCHOLARSHIP

This scholarship is named in honor of Nathan J. "Mule Train" Lewis. Mule Train was instrumental in keeping the Trojan spirit alive, thus our coming together for school reunions. The scholarship will be awarded to the child, grandchild, or great-grandchild of a current member of the association. Membership must have been established at least (2) years prior to the application distribution. The applicant must be a graduating senior from an accredited public, charter, home school or parochial school who has a cumulative GPA of 2.5 or above.

JAMES E. WOOD ENGINEERING SCHOLARSHIP


This scholarship is awarded in the amount of \$2,000.00 to an applicant from ECPS who meets the criteria of the WALTER A. PATTILLO ALUMNI SCHOLARSHIP. The recipient must be a first-year undergraduate student enrolled at North Carolina A&T University, Greensboro, NC declaring a major in the field of engineering. This scholarship is funded annually by the family of the late James E. Wood.

HARRISON FAMILY MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP

An endowed scholarship awarded in two equal installments to an applicant who meets the criteria of the Nathan Lewis Member Scholarships, who has been accepted into an accredited college or university and also has a Grade Point Average not lower than 3.0. This scholarship is funded annually by the Harrison Family and administered by the W. A. Pattillo High School National Alumni Association.

WILLIAMS FAMILY SCHOLARSHIP

Presently, a single-year endowed scholarship awarded to an applicant from the ECPS who meets the criteria of the Walter A. Pattillo Alumni Scholarship or W. A. Pattillo Secondary Alumni Scholarship who will major in Automotive Systems technology or Facility Maintenance at Edgecombe Community College. This scholarship is funded by the Williams Family and administered by the W. A. Pattillo High School National Alumni Association.



Distinguished Graduate Gordon Fletcher Bullock

Whenever there was a question that related to science, there was one who always knew the answer. To folks in his hometown of Tarboro, he was known as Collie. In Hampton and Newport News, VA, where he spent most of his life, he was known as Gordon Fletcher Bullock.

Gordon's interest in science began when he was a boy. The story told by his parents, Carey and Catherine Dancy Bullock, is that he once experimented on a lamp, took it completely apart, put it back together and as a result, it caught on fire. Nevertheless, that didn't diminish his love of experimenting and exploring science.

Gordon often told stories of growing up with his siblings Carey (Karo), Marion (Teetee), Lewis (Bug), Martha (Dot), Milton Douglas and Mittie. His father had a big truck and he enjoyed helping his father when he moved families to another house.

Upon graduation from Pattillo High School in 1951, Gordon went to the Air Force. During his four years of service, of course, he worked in the electrical department. He enjoyed his tour of duty and especially loved his overseas tour of Germany and took advantage of visiting many of the nearby countries.

Following his honorable discharge from the Air Force, Gordon went to North Carolina A&T State University where he obtained a Bachelor's Degree in Electrical Engineering. While at A&T, he served as the articles editor for the A&T Register, the school's newspaper. After graduation in 1962, Gordon went to work at NASA Langley Research Center in Hampton, VA as one of the few black engineers at that time. He fondly recalled his first interview there. He was asked the same question repeatedly. He was not intimidated by that questioning and answered the same question the same way each time. He was being tested, but he knew exactly what he was talking about and never changed the original answer to the question.

At NASA, Gordon worked on many space-related projects and for his job he often traveled to other NASA sites across the country, including in Texas and Florida. He designed items that were sent on space shuttle missions for experimentation and made a big impact on the space industry. He had fond memories of working at Wallops Island, NASA's test flight facility on the Eastern Shore of Virginia. After 30 years of a successful career as an Aerospace Engineer with NASA, Gordon retired and enjoyed retirement life.

For many years, Gordon served as a science fair judge for the Newport News School Division. He was always enthusiastic about looking at and evaluating the students' projects, and he always encouraged boys and girls to pursue higher education. He was a lifetime member of the NAACP. For several years, he volunteered with the LINK Hunger Program and the Help Him Now Program. Those programs gave him an opportunity to interact with and help many people. In addition, Gordon was appointed by former Governor John Dalton to serve on the Virginia Division for Children in the 1970s.





Wall of Fame Margarette Bullock Powell Band/Chorus

Margarette Bullock Powell graduated from W. A. Pattillo High School in 1954. Margarette was the salutatorian of her class. While a student at Pattillo, she was a majorette, in the glee club, on the basketball team, a member of the drama club and a cheerleader. She received numerous church awards for teaching Sunday school and served as pianist for Macedonia Baptist Church in Princeville for numerous years. Margarette was also a Girl Scout.

She furthered her education at Shaw University in Raleigh, North Carolina. Margarette graduated from Shaw in 1959 with a degree in Teacher Education and graduated magna cum laude in her class. While attending Shaw, she became a member of Alpha Kapp Mu Honor Society and was also a member of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority. She was Shaw's May Queen, "55", and Miss Shaw University "58". After graduating from Shaw, she returned to Princeville where she taught at Princeville Elementary School.

Margarette got married and moved to Newport News, Virginia where she taught for the Newport News Public School system. She moved to Brooklyn, New York where she became a teacher of "gifted students", and later became a principal, and was awarded the Astor Foundation award as an educator. Margarette received her Master's Degree in Education from New York University. Margarette returned to Newport News and opened a boutique shop. She later moved her shop to Yorktown, Virginia. Margarette now resides in High Point, North Carolina.





Founder's Award Dr. Beverly J. Whitest, PhD

Beverly J. Whitest was born in Princeville, NC on August 17, 1951. She is the third of six children. She attended Princeville Elementary School until third grade, W. A. Pattillo High School from grades 4 through 9, and was among the first Blacks to attend Tarboro High School in 1966. Beverly then became one of six Blacks in a class of 56 students that graduated from Tarboro High School in 1969.

Beverly's higher educational accomplishments include: a Bachelor's Degree from NC A&T State University in Greensboro, NC where she graduated with honors; a Master's of Public Administration from Atlanta Graduate School in Atlanta, GA where she was one of the first five to graduate from this new program in 1976; a Master's Degree in Adult Education and a Doctorate Degree in Philosophy, Education in 1998 from the University of College Park in College Park, MD. Dr. Whitest was the first African American to receive the Benjamin Fellowship from the School of Education and she also received a grant from the Graduate School of Diversity Council.

The first job Beverly held after graduation from NC A&T State University was a Secretary at Walter Reed Outpatient Clinic. Over the years, she has served in a multiplicity of positions, including but not limited to: an Urban Planner for the City of Atlanta; a Transportation Planner for the State of Tennessee; a Research Assistant, Grant Coordinator and Director of Planning & Evaluation in Atlanta's Department of Public Health, a statewide Internal Auditor for Public Health in Georgia; Director of Graduate Studies in Administration & Health at Trinity University. Dr. Whitest also taught in the Business Administration Program at Saat Academy for Management in Cairo, Egypt.

Currently, Dr. Whitest is employed by the Georgia Department of Corrections as Director of elearning and Education. Her staff developed and implemented all in-service and pre-service orientation classes online. Her staff also coordinates all of the Professional Management programs, the Command College and the Certified Manager's Program.

Dr. Whitest is also a Training Major with Georgia Corrections Academy and teaches law enforcement and corrections officers for the State of Georgia.

Beverly is a member of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority; serves on the Board of Directors at Unity of South African Church; a member of the Board of Directors of West End Medical Center and the Center for Battered Women.

She is the mother of two sons: Malik Hazi Whitest-Hill and Jelani Whitest-Hill. Beverly also has three grand-children.

Who: Sam G. Pippen Job: Eighth-grade mathematics teacher Thomas C. Boushall Middle School

How long have you been working in Richmond Public Schools?

I have been a teacher in Richmond Public Schools for a total of 33 years including this school year.

Why did you decide to become a math teacher?

When I first came to the Richmond public school system in August of 1968, my first teaching assignment was that of mathematics and science, and I have been teaching mathematics ever since.

What do your students remember most about your class?

Talking with former students as they come by my present school to visit me or as I see them in the community, they thank me for being the kind of teacher who was very kind to them, very patient

with them, and the kind of teacher who took that extra step to really explain things to them. Some of my students even thanked me for being very firm with them, but also very fair.

Do you keep in touch with your students?

I keep in touch with most of my former students one way or another. Most of them keep in touch with me either by visiting me at my present teaching location or by telephone, and some even find time to write me letters to thank me for being a positive role model for them. Some even invite me to their weddings.

What were you like as a student?

Some things were very easy to me, and others I really had to work hard to achieve. I was always very serious minded

in the classroom and very playful at recess (something today's middle school students don't know anything about).

For you, what is the most rewarding part of being a math teacher?

The most rewarding part of being a math teacher is when I see the smile on a child's face when he/she has mastered a particular math skill or concept. Another rewarding experience is when a child tells me that he or she is attending college, majoring in mathematics, and I was the one who influenced him or her.

Who is your role model?

My mother was and still is my role model. She told me to always use my Godgiven talents to help people better themselves in life, and that way your living here on earth would not have been in vain.
