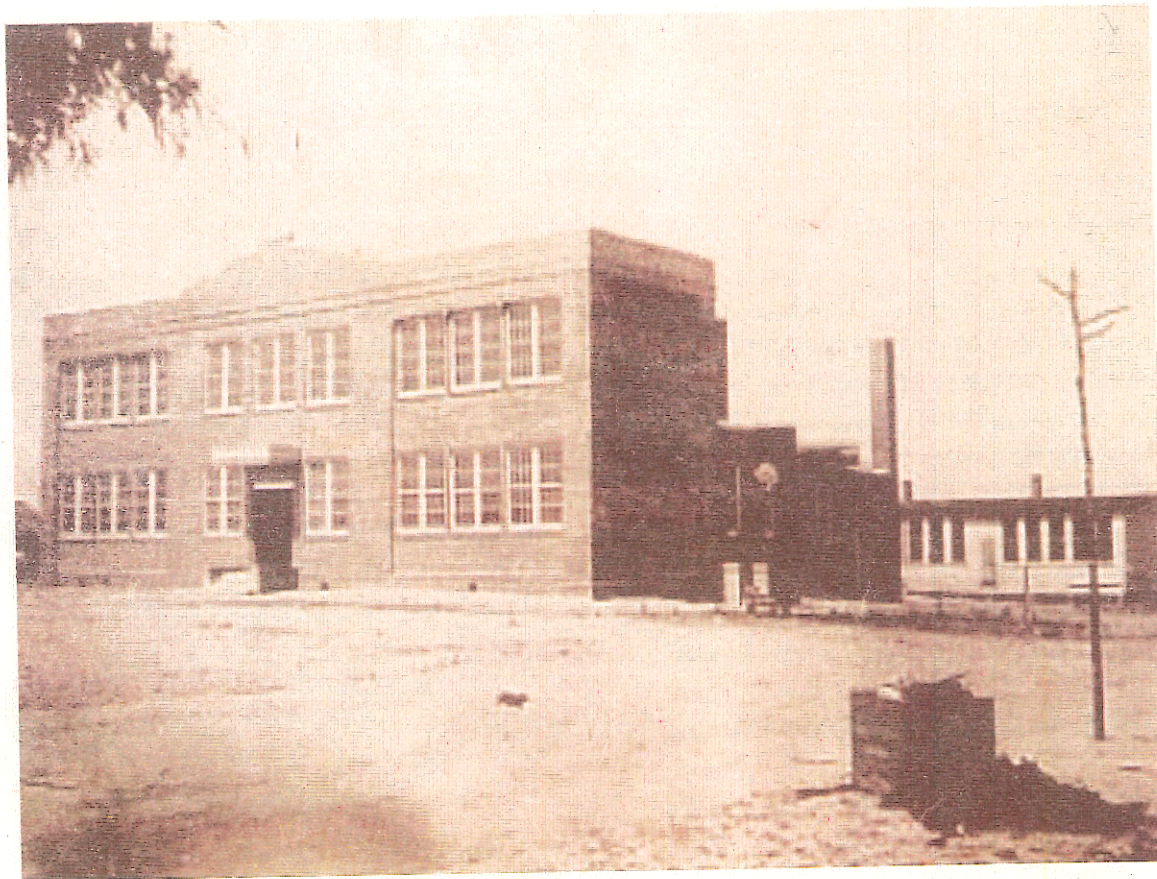

W. A. Pattillo High School

This volume celebrates the graduating classes of the W. A. Pattillo High School, originally the Tarboro Colored High School. It was renamed in 1943 for W. A. Pattillo, the school's first Principal.

The Pattillo School had its origins in the Princeville Graded School, founded in 1881 and which made outstanding growth under the leadership of Principals: W. P. Mabson, a graduate of Lincoln College (now Lincoln University); John Jones, a graduate of Oberlin College; and William A. Perry, a native of Tarboro and a graduate of Yale University. The first eighth-grade class was graduated in 1909.

In 1912, Walter Alexander Pattillo succeeded Perry. A few high school courses were added to the curriculum. In 1923-24, the Julius Rosenwald Fund helped finance the construction of a two-story eight-teacher brick building in east Tarboro, and Pattillo became its principal, a position he held until his retirement in 1943.

Princeville students in grades 1-4 now attended classes in the Princeville Graded School building, while Tarboro students in grades 1-4 now attended classes in the new east Tarboro building. All students in grades 5-8 and in high school attended classes in the new building in east Tarboro.

The first high school class was graduated in 1924 with three members. In 1931, an additional building with 17 rooms was added along with more teachers making a grand total of 700 students, 34 classrooms, 38 teachers, one principal and two schools. The Tarboro Colored High School, which included the grammar school grades, held the classification of a "union school," that is, a school with both elementary and secondary classes.

In the fall of 1943 a group of concerned citizens petitioned the Tarboro Board of Education to change the school from the Tarboro Colored High School to the W. A. Pattillo High School to honor its founder's numerous contributions and dedication. The petition was approved by the school board and a ceremony was held on May 30, 1943. The first class to graduate with the new name was the class of 1944.

Professor Pattillo retired in 1946, and his son Walter H. Pattillo was appointed principal.

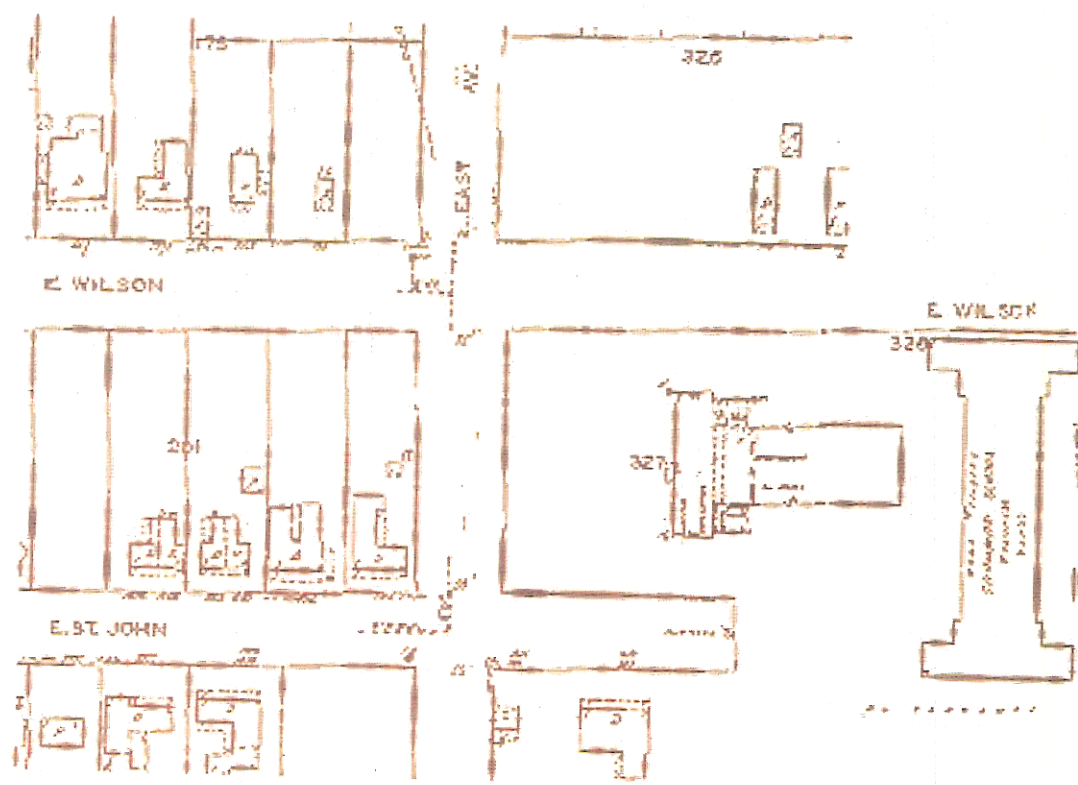
The school developed into a community center for the East Tarboro African-American citizens for a variety of activities, including concerts, piano recitals, dramatic plays, banquets, dances, fundraisers. It had the full support of the whole community, because each individual in the community felt a strong connection with the educational institution by being a graduate or being a relative of a graduate or by having a relative enrolled.

On W. H. Pattillo's retirement in 1960, R. H. Cherry was appointed principal. He was followed by Rudolph W. Snowden (1967 - 1968) who, in turn, was followed by James Barnes (1968 - 1970).

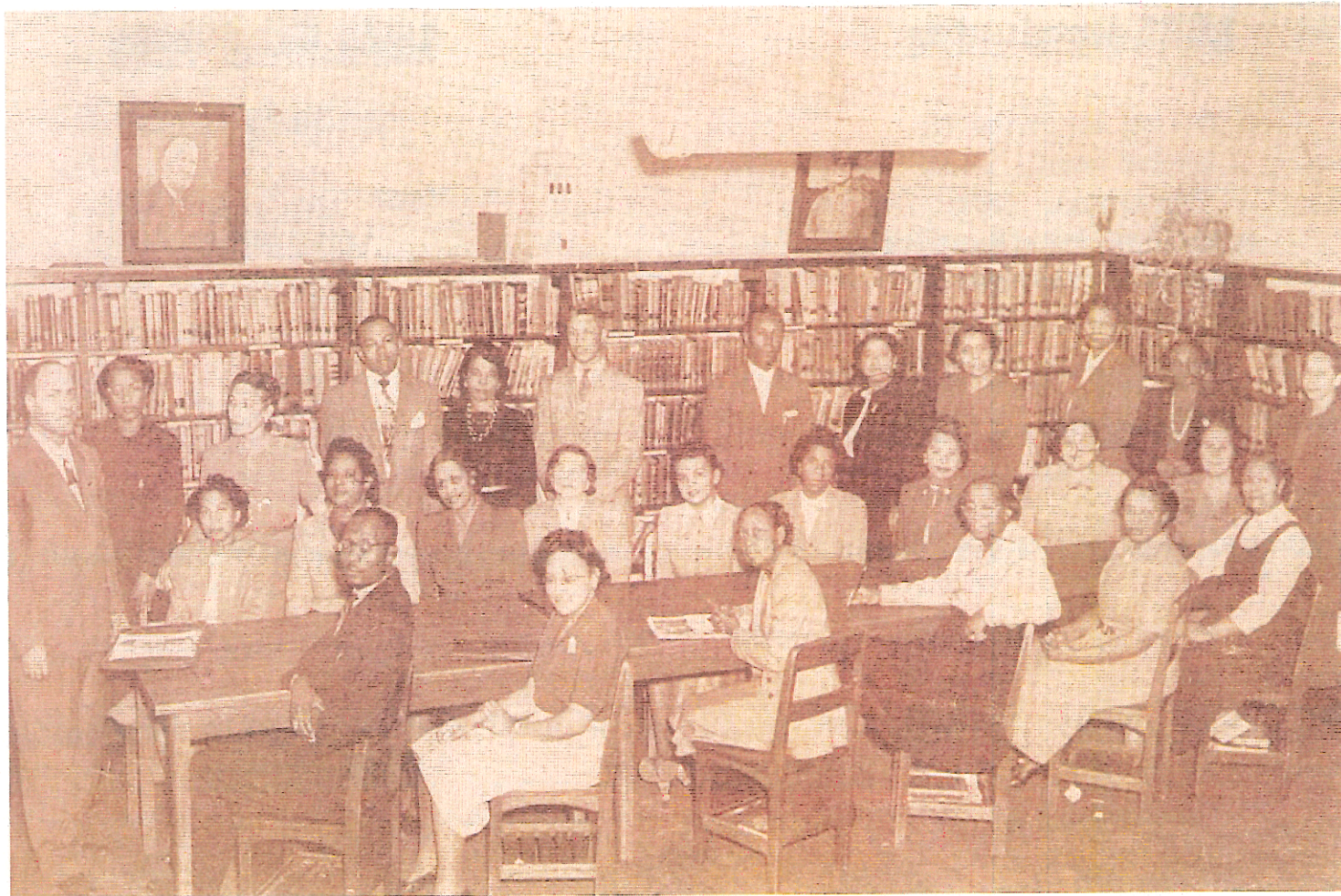
The Class of 1970 was the last class graduated from the W. A. Pattillo High School. With full integration, subsequent classes graduated from Tarboro High School.

The Perry-Weston Educational and Cultural Institute, Inc. promotes African American history, genealogy, culture, and arts particularly, in Edgecombe County and North Carolina. The Institute also promotes the conservation and preservation of selected African-American buildings, sites, and records. The Institute sponsors classes, lectures, exhibits, demonstrations, publications, and special projects and programs.

The Perry-Weston Institute is named for the Reverend John W. Perry, first rector of St. Luke's Episcopal Church in Tarboro, North Carolina, and his daughter Mrs. Catherine Perry Weston. Mrs. Weston was the wife of Reverend Milton Moran Weston, the second rector of St. Luke's Episcopal Church; the mother of the Rev. Dr. Milton Moran Weston, Jr., rector of St. Phillip's Episcopal Church in New York (Harlem); and the great aunt of the Rev. Dr. Kwasi Thornell, an Episcopal Priest formerly with the National Cathedral in Washington, DC.

Mrs. Weston's parents, the Reverend John W. Perry and Mrs. Mary Eliza Pettipher Perry, operated St. Luke's Parochial School beginning September, 1881, and the school continued until 1957. In later years it

was operated by their daughter Mrs. Catherine Perry Weston and her husband, Rev. M. M. Weston. The Perry School was located on Panola Street, adjacent to the Mount Lebanon Masonic Hall.
