








Dedication of the arch to the school in honor of Principal W. A. Pattillo by the Class of 1949

#### FOUNDER



**NATHAN LEWIS** 

Born on September 23, 1934, Nathan Lewis was raised by his grandmother, Mary Eliza Lewis. He loved Tarboro and his football playing days at Pattillo High School passionately. After graduating from Pattillo in 1955, he accepted a full scholarship at Shaw University where he also played football. His teammates nicknamed him "Mule Train" because he hit hard, protected the ball and ran with great speed. Nathan was inducted into the Hall of Fame at Shaw University for his exceptional football skills, determination and ultimate love of the game. He graduated from Shaw University with a Bachelor of Science Degree in Education. Later, he got a Master's Degree in Special Education from Antioch University.

After leaving Shaw, he married the former Peggy Bailey while they were employed as teachers at an elementary school in Georgetown, SC. Later they moved to Philadelphia, PA where he had an interesting and productive career to include the following: a teacher at Daniel Boone Public School for students with behavioral and emotional challenges; in the evenings he worked at Western Community House with juvenile boys; Director of Education for the Pennsylvania Department of Justice at Grateford Prison; simultaneously he taught Criminal Justice classes in the evenings at West Chester University. After his retirement from Grateford Prison, he accepted a position in special education at Camden High School in Camden, NJ where he was given the opportunity to assist the football coaching staff — for him, a dream come true.

He belonged to the NAACP and The Chapel of Four Chaplains. He was a member of J. C. Price Lodge #82, Prince Hall affiliation; The United Supreme Council (Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite of Free Masonary), Prince Hall Affiliation, North Jurisdiction, USA, Inc.; and the Shrines Pyramid Temple #1. He also served as a faithful member of Bright Hope Baptist Church.

Nathan returned home often to visit and enjoyed sharing stories about growing up with his friends and telling jokes. He was especially proud of his grandchildren and great-grandchildren. He expired September 10, 2010.

#### **WILLIAM HENRY BOYD**

Fondly known as "Henny Penny," William H. Boyd was born in 1938. He was raised in an area of Tarboro, known as the "Depot." It was an African American residential and commercial area which was the last section of Tarboro to be developed. From 1938 until 1955, his family's residence was located at 1717 Main Street. After his father died in 1955, the family relocated to Princeville. His parents were John Henry Boyd (affectionately known as "Pee Wee") and Jessie Perkins Boyd. He has four siblings – Roland, Ruth, Elizabeth and Curtis.


William was a graduate of the Pattillo High School Class of 1959. He participated in varsity football as a guard and defensive tackle. He was also an avid baseball player. He played as an outfielder and catcher. His athletic career spanned from 1954-1957.

In 1967, he married the former Nannie Lyons who is now deceased. They were blessed with two sons from their union: Lovell, born in 1969 and Douglas, born in 1973. Henny Penny also fathered a son born in 1960, Marvin Tyson. He is a proud grandfather of several grandchildren.

GEORGE E. WORSLEY, SR.

The only child born to George Worsley and Carey Pettaway, George Edward Worsley, Sr. was born in Tarboro, North Carolina on July 14, 1922.

George was a 1940 graduate of W. A. Pattillo High School. He joined the U.S. Marines on May 26, 1943. He served his country in World War II and he was honorably discharged on December 29, 1945. He furthered his education at Howard University where he received a BA Degree in Liberal Arts in 1952.


His initial marriage was to the late Amanda Ward. They had three children: George E. Worsley, Jr. (deceased), Richard Worsley and Bessie Worsley-Cross. This marriage ended in divorce. George then married the late Willie M. Johnson. They had a daughter, Sharon Worsley-Tarpley. He also had a step-daughter as a result of this marriage, Karen Williams. #### **HISTORY**

The W. A. Pattillo High School Alumni Association was the brain child of four of its graduates – Nathan Lewis (Class of 1955), William Boyd (Class of 1959), Rayfield Perkins (Class of 1955), and George Worsley (Class of 1940). Members of the Class of 1955 consented to contribute proceeds from their class reunion held in 1978 to organize the Pattillo alumni association. Nathan, Rayfield, William and George made several contacts, encouraging and recruiting other graduates and former students to participate and attend meetings. As a result, chapters were formed in various cities since many of the participants resided out-of-state, predominately in Washington, DC and Philadelphia, PA.


More supporters were attracted following the first reunion. They included: Iris Braswell, Charlie Brown, Lois Cobb, Myrna Deloatch, Evelyn Faulk, Eunice Parker, Hubert Simmons, Grace Swinson, and Rev. James Wooten. During that time, the Interim National President was Nathan Lewis and Iris Braswell served as the Tarboro Chapter President. Alfred Norfleet became the Washington, DC Chapter President and Grady Ashe was elected as the Baltimore, MD Chapter President.

Under the tenure of National President Earlene W. Lawrence, in 1983, the alumni association secured a state charter and become incorporated. Pattillo graduates, Attorneys Jessie Baker and Glennie Matthewson provided assistance. Initially the organization was chartered as the Tarboro Black Education Alumni Association but was later amended to be the W. A. Pattillo High School National Alumni Association, Inc. Charter members included: Grady Ashe, Iris Braswell, Cora Boddie, Jimmie Bullock, Helen Knight, Lorna Lloyd, George Matthewson, and Thomas Perry. The Tidewater chapter was later formed in 1983.

Several Pattillo attendees have served as the National President. They are Nathan Lewis, Jimmie Bullock, Barbara Bratcher Anderson, Earlene Knight Womack, Eva Norfleet, Thomas Newton, and Varnell Vines Kinnin. Fred E. Wood, Jr., Ed. D., was elected in July 2011 and is currently serving in the capacity as National President.

The association has a 501c (3) status with a Board of Directors and a standard slate of officers. It continues to carry out the purpose according to the articles of incorporation which is: to provide scholarships and grants to students deemed worthy by the organization for assistance to further their education; and to provide financial and other assistance to educational institutions at all levels. The association has donated over \$100,000 in scholarships, incentive awards and contributions which have been given to area students and schools in the Edgecombe County Public Schools and beyond since its inception. In 2014, the first Nathan Lewis Member Scholarship was awarded to a senior who graduated from high school in Erial, New Jersey.

The association sponsors a variety of programs and supports local businesses; however, contributions to education are the core of its success. The alumni association will continue its endeavors to improve mankind's quality of life by supporting education at all levels.



#### Distinguished Alumnus



Herbert A. Exum, Ph.D.

Dr. Herbert A. Exum was born in Tarboro, NC as the first child of Savalius A. Exum, Jr. and May Bell Moten Exum. Herbert, his brother, Savalius Von Exum III (deceased) and his sister, Mary Michelle Exum (deceased) lived at 1114 East Baker Street in Tarboro until 1965 when his parents and siblings relocated to Goldsboro, NC. His parents allowed Herbert to remain in Tarboro with his grandparents Savalius A. Exum, Sr. and Mary Hortense Exum so that he could graduate from W. A. Pattillo High School, which he did in 1967 as the class valedictorian.

He began his undergraduate studies at Duke University in Durham, NC and later transferred to Federal City College (now the University of the District of Columbia) where he graduated with honors with a bachelors degree in Psychology in 1972. He continued his education at the University of Minnesota in Minneapolis, Minnesota funded by an EPDA Fellowship. He completed both his masters and doctorate degrees at the University of Minnesota where he earned a MA in 1974 and a PhD in 1978 both in Counseling and Student Personnel Psychology. Dr. Exum then went on to accept academic positions at the University of Iowa followed by the University of Wisconsin before returning to North Carolina as Associate Dean for Research and Graduate Studies in the College of Education and Psychology at North Carolina State University (NCSU).

From 1984 to 1994 he served as Associate Dean at NCSU before returning to work as a full-time faculty member. Dr. Exum served as a Fulbright Professor of Education at the University of Joensuu in Finland in 1998-99. He joined the faculty of the Counselor Education Program at the University of South Florida in Tampa, Florida in 2003. While at the University of South Florida, he was the Chair of the Department of Psychological and Social Foundations from 2005 to 2011. Currently, Dr. Exum is a tenured graduate Professor in the Department of Leadership, Counseling and Adult, Career and Higher Education at the University of South Florida.

Dr. Exum's overall research interests focus on theories and practices of counseling, psychotherapy, and cognitive development. His related interests include counselor education and supervision, community mental health, and psychological trauma. He has taught a variety of graduate courses in counseling and psychotherapy, and served as the major professor and thesis director for 45 PhD students and scores of Master's students. In addition, Dr. Exum has over 35 years of clinical experience in a variety of community-based social service organizations and agencies throughout the United States as well as in private practice. He is currently serving as a Diplomate of the American Psychotherapy Association. He is the author of two books, and numerous book chapters and articles.

Herbert is the husband of Obelia Johnson Exum, Head Graphic Designer at the North Carolina Museum of History located in Raleigh, NC and the father of Kamilah Imani Exum, an attorney now located in Chicago, Illinois; Bakari Akil Exum, a chef currently in Johnson City, Tennessee; and Ahmed Raphael Exum, a rising senior at Southeast Raleigh High School in Raleigh, North Carolina.

He was also elected as President of the student body in 1959 at Pattillo. As a youth, Robert was a member of Eastern Star Baptist Church where he attended church and Sunday school. He is a retired U. S. Air Force Master Sargent with 26 years of service including a tour in Vietnam. After his military career, Robert worked 15 years as a Top Clearance Armed Guard for the Boeing Commercial Military Aircraft Company in Seattle, Washington. His career with Boeing included providing security for classified aircrafts to include the Presidential "Air Force One". Robert is a dedicated Mason who has served as Past Master of Cherry Blossom Lodge, No. 42 of the Most Worshipful Prince Hall Grand Lodge of Washington State. He led several fundraisers in that capacity to help deserving African Americans attend college. In 1991, Robert was elevated to Grand Inspector General, the esteemed level of 33<sup>rd</sup> Degree, after many years of dedicated service to the Masonry. He is the proud grandfather of six and the father of three adult children: Dorothea, Robert, and Chris.



#### **Band & Chorus Hall of Fame**

The late Ronald Hilliard was a graduate in the W. A. Pattillo High School Class of 1955. During his high school tenure, he played quarterback for the football team his junior and senior years; and baseball as an "ace" left-handed pitcher. Ronald was renowned in choral music. He received several honors as a soloist and tenor. Many Tarboro citizens still remember him as a gifted young singer at a special program that was held at the then Tarboro High School where he received a standing ovation for his musical performance. Ronald was active in the youth NAACP under Mrs. Beatrice Burnett. He was also active in his church Sunday school choir as a gifted vocalist, and he was called upon to participate in numerous community events. He received several awards for his involvement in youth activities. After graduating from Pattillo, Ronald moved to the north where he performed in nightclubs in New York City and New Jersey. He also performed at the Apollo Theater several times. Ronald pursued a career in law enforcement and served as a youth Detention Officer and mentor to young people in New York City and New Jersey.

The W. A. Pattillo Scholarship

The W. A. Pattillo scholarship is named in celebration of Principal Walter Alexander Pattillo. It is an annual scholarship awarded to a college-bound graduating senior in the Edgecombe County Public Schools.

Walter A. Pattillo relocated his family to 520 E. St. James Street in Tarboro, NC after he accepted a position as principal at Princeville Graded School in 1912. Mr. Pattillo expanded on an existing educational system by making additions to the curriculum for the students in the black community.

In east Tarboro, the first high school building was built in 1921 and Walter Alexander Pattillo was its principal. Tarboro Colored High School was constructed by financial assistance from the Julius Rosenwald Fund in 1923-24. This was a comprehensive union school including grades one (1) through eleven (11). The Class of 1924 was its first graduates. It was not until school year 1946-47 that grade twelve (12) was added.

In honor of Walter A. Pattillo's dedication, commitment and contributions, Tarboro Colored High School underwent a name change to W. A. Pattillo High School in 1943. The Class of 1944 was the first graduating class from W. A. Pattillo High School. A brick wall and marble arch in front of the school with "W. A. Pattillo High School " etched into the archway was erected overhead to honor Mr. Pattillo by the Class of 1949. This class dedicated their yearbook to him as well.

On May 18, 1876, Walter Alexander Pattillo was born to Reverend W. A. and Mrs. Mary Ida Hart Pattillo in Virgilina, Virginia. Reverend and Mrs. Pattillo were the parents of fourteen children.

Walter A. Pattillo married Sallie Jeannette Watson from Henderson, NC on February 14, 1901. Additionally, he graduated from Shaw University with a degree in Theology in 1901. Walter and Sallie had four (4) children: Walter Hugh Pattillo, William Charles Pattillo, Harold Claudius Pattillo and Anna Mae Pattillo Murdough. All of their children matriculated and graduated from Shaw University as they had.

Mr. Pattillo was an active participant in the community. He was a member of Union Baptist Church for twenty (20) years where he served as a deacon and the church clerk. During his lifetime, some of Mr. Pattillo's other affiliations were: a member of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, a Mason, a Knight of Pythias, an Oddfellow, president of Edgecombe Credit Union and a member of the City Recreation Committee.

After his retirement in 1946, his son, Walter Hugh Pattillo took up the helm as principal of W. A. Pattillo High School. The Class of 1970 was the last class to graduate from W. A. Pattillo High School due to legally mandated integration of Tarboro City schools. A few years later, the W. A. Pattillo High School structure was demolished.

Mr. Walter Alexander Pattillo died in 1951. His wife, children and two grandchildren were survivors at the time of his passing.

The Pearl Bennett and Fannie Bridgers Scholarship

From the early 1920's until 1962 when both ladies retired, Pearl Ward Bennett and Fannie Olivia Bridgers were teachers at the old Princeville School.

Born September 10, 1898, Mrs. Bennett grew up in Bertie County, N. C. on the Ward family farm. She was educated at Elizabeth City Normal School (now Elizabeth City State University). She studied further at Shaw University in Raleigh, N. C. On January 12, 1973, she died in Quigless Clinic in Tarboro, N. C. Her resting place is the Ward Cemetery in Bertie County beside Daniel and Mary Mizel Ward, her parents.

Miss Bridgers was born March 22, 1898 in Tarboro. Her parents were Jerry and Francis Bridgers. In 1982, she died. Her burial site is located at Eastlawn Cemetery in Tarboro next to a veteran teacher in the Tarboro School System, her niece, Mrs. Dorothy Bridgers Smoot.

These two women were not only veteran teachers but humanitarians as well. They went above and beyond the call of duty as teachers. According to the late Cary "Karo" Bullock, in the late 1940's, he had the task as a high school bus driver, to pick up "Miss Fannie" and "Miss Pearl" each week day morning with his bus to take them to Princeville School. He didn't just pick them up; he also had to pick up their pots and pans.

These two special ladies would go home in the afternoon and cook soup and other foods to feed their students the next day. They used their own money to buy all the ingredients. There was no school cafeteria at that time. Cary said he would take them and the pots and pans back home every afternoon.

David Smoot, Miss Fannie's nephew, remembers later in the years that neither lady had a car, so they would walk from East Tarboro to Princeville daily in order to teach their students. In 1960, Miss Fannie's niece, Dorothy Smoot, bought a car and she would take them to school and pick them up. After David married Dorothy, he would often pick them up, too.

Both ladies were founding members of the Edgecombe County Chapter of the NAACP. The charter for the Edgecombe County Chapter was approved on October 13, 1942 by the national office. Both women were very active members in this organization.

This scholarship is named each year to honor different educators employed at Pattillo and/or Princeville Schools.

The Nathan Lewis Member Scholarship

In an effort to provide more benefits to members of the association who reside outside of the corporate limits of Edgecombe County, the association's Scholarship Committee was requested to consider the merits of a "member scholarship." Consequently, the Scholarship Committee's recommendation was to offer a scholarship to children, grandchildren, and great grandchildren of individuals who have maintained a twenty-four (24) month consecutive membership in the alumni association. Created in 2014, this scholarship was named to commemorate alumnus Nathan Lewis for his initial efforts to start the association and maintain its operation.

Nathan was a 1955 graduate of W. A. Pattillo High School. He received a Bachelor's degree in Education from Shaw University in Raleigh, NC and a Master's degree in Special Education from Antioch University, the Yellow Springs, Ohio campus. He was married to the former Peggy Bailey and they have three children – two sons and a daughter.

Several of his high school classmates remember Nathan as being an extrovert. "He was a very out-going person, funny and jovial; he even served as a substitute school bus driver for me when it was needed," according to his classmate and close friend, Excee Smith. From the female perspective, his classmate Anna Robinson Barnes commented, "He had very good interpersonal skills, he liked to tease in a good way, and he was a strong athlete." Milton Tucker stated, "He really, really liked people. He was a friendly, sociable and kind person."

The very core of Nathan's kind and caring nature for people and his strength as an athlete permeated throughout his entire life. He was a faithful church member and belonged to several community organizations. He experienced a stellar career which demonstrated his devotion to helping mankind -- especially young people. His work history included but was not limited to: an elementary school teacher, a mentor and teacher of juvenile boys, a special education teacher, an assistant to a high school football coaching staff, a teacher of criminal justice classes, and last but not least, a Director of Education in the Pennsylvania State prison system. He had a lifelong passion for sharing and caring.

The first Nathan Lewis member scholarship was awarded in 2014 to his granddaughter, Christina Green, who graduated from Timber Creek High School in Erial, New Jersey. She is currently a Biology major at Rowan University in Glassboro, New Jersey.

The William Stephens Batchelor Memorial Scholarship

Mrs. William Stephens Batchelor was born on November 29, 1931 in Edgecombe County to William H. Stephens and Addie H. Stephens. Her siblings included six brothers and two sisters — three of whom are surviving and residing in the area.

In October 1950, she married her high school sweetheart, Asbury C. Batchelor and gave birth to one daughter, Marlon Dianne. Together, they created a loving home in Princeville and later in Tarboro. One of her special bonds was shared with her son-in-law, Dr. EC Land. She was predeceased by her grandson, Ryan.

In her early years, she attended Daniel School (a Rosenwald School in Edgecombe County). Her parents arranged for her to live with a cousin in Tarboro so she could attend W. A. Pattillo High School due to limited educational access in their community. She was able to return home and graduated from Conetoe High School after it was established.

Although she married immediately after graduation, she promised her father that she would pursue a college degree. When her daughter entered first grade, she kept that promise and began studies as Shaw University with the support of her family. After receiving a degree in Education, she was immediately employed at Princeville School where she taught second grade for 30 years. After retirement, she worked periodically on a part-time basis at the same school.

She wore many hats: First lady for 19 years during her husband's pastorate at Phillippi Missionary Baptist Church in Simpson, NC (Pitt County); a Sunday School/Bible Study teacher; Church Day Care Administrator; and presenter for women's studies, mission and other topics. Her love and zeal for teaching, learning and sharing never ceased.

Always an avid reader, she also loved cooking, gardening, and decorating. Shopping with her daughter was always an adventure she enjoyed. Many women loved that she would recycle her clothes by letting them come by and telling them, "see what you can use". Oftentimes homebound and elderly individuals would receive meals which she enjoyed preparing and delivering with a smile and conversation. She had a heart for listening to people and providing specific and random acts of kindness.

Since her demise in November 2005, her family has sought to promote her legacy. She strived to make a difference in the lives of others. This scholarship was initiated in her memory in early 2006 to commemorate her gentle, sharing, loving spirit and commitment to education and humankind. Seven graduates have received this award in eastern North Carolina. This year (2014-2015), her family chose to support a student through the W. A. Pattillo High School National Alumni Association, Inc. Undoubtedly, she would be smiling with humility and approval to share in this great educational opportunity.

The Jimmie L. Stanley Incentive Award

Jimmie Lee Stanley (affectionately known as Jimmie Lee) was born in Edgecombe County to the late Rudolph and Lila Bell Stanley. He attended Conetoe High School and left school in 1951 to serve his country in the United States Army during the Korean Conflict. Also in 1951, he married the former Carrie Dickens. Jimmie Lee returned to Conetoe High School after his tour of duty in the military and graduated from Conetoe High in 1957.

Jimmie has always enjoyed singing. While he was a student at Conetoe High School, he sang in the choir under the direction of Walter Plemmer. As a member of the 1957 Conetoe High Quartet, he performed on the Ted Mack Original Amateur Hour; Radio City Music Hall; and with the Jimmy Dorsey Band. Jimmie Lee was also a tenor with the Tarboro Jubilee Singers.

His employment afforded him the opportunity to do what he loved best – WORK WITH PEOPLE. Jimmie Lee focused on working with families and young people. His was committed to helping youth and dedicated to making a positive impact on the lives of citizens in the Princeville/Tarboro areas. His employment experience includes: an insurance agent with North Carolina Mutual Insurance Company; a job placement specialist with NEED, Inc.; and a housing specialist with the Town of Tarboro's Urban Renewal Project.

It was an invaluable and rewarding experience for Jimmie to help high school and college students learn job skills in his position as a job placement specialist. They were also taught how to complete job applications, how to create resumes, how to dress appropriately for interviews, and how to practice sound interview skills. With his help, students acquired jobs in school offices, school cafeterias, the recreation department, and fast food restaurants. Students also enjoyed and learned from making field trips to historical sites throughout North Carolina.

Jimmie and his wife Carrie reside in Princeville, NC. They are the parents of two adult children, Felicia A. Stanley and Morris Lee Stanley.

The incentive award is presented to students in each of the middle and elementary schools in Edgecombe County. It is named in honor of a Tarboro or Princeville citizen whose life made a positive impact on his/her community. The

While my sisters and I, like most siblings, engaged in teenage spats, the memory of the "Stove Shovel" and its meaning have been a guidepost for a wonderful relationship in our adult lives for over 60 years.
